Taipei begins cooperation on eco-friendly bags with big retailers Taipei, April 15, 2016

- 1 Taipei has begun working with four major supermarkets and retailers in the city this year to
- 2 promote dual-use eco-friendly bags that it hopes will help reduce waste, the city government
- 3 said Friday.
- 4 The city said it is cooperating with PXMart, Carrefour Taiwan, RT-Mart and A.mart to distribute
- 5 the 14-liter eco-friendly bags that can be used as both shopping bags and garbage bags.
- 6 Taipei is expecting the supermarkets and big-box retailers, which come in direct contact with
- 7 consumers, to be on the front line of promoting the environmentally friendly policy, the city
- 8 said.
- 9 Supermarket PXMart said it has encouraged consumers to prepare their own bags when
- 10 shopping at its stores, but it has also picked up 100,000 two-way bags from the city
- 11 government this year to make them available for consumers to meet their temporary needs.
- 12 PXMart said that while the dual-use bags are thinner than the shopping bags it usually sells in
- 13 its stores, they are able to hold as much weight as the other bags.
- 14 The two-way bags, which meet national standards, are priced at US\$0.15, the same as Taipei
- 15 City's designated 14-liter garbage bag, making them a bargain considering their multiple uses,
- 16 the city said.

- 4 Natasha Blackwood works with the Refugee and Immigrant Advisory Council. Her husband
- 5 Aaron is an insurance broker. They have two young children. Nina, 3, is in full time day care
- 6 and Lucy, 8, is in primary school.
- 7 "We live really frugally*, We don't smoke or drink or shop or party and we still have a very
- 8 strict budget so we can pay our student loan payments and our daycare bill," said Blackwood.
- 9 Natasha Blackwood says the 2016 provincial budget will hit her family hard.
- 10 "We're educated people who work full-time," she said.
- 11 "We don't generally go on vacations but we do put money aside so our kids can go to classes.
- 12 like dance and swimming and we sacrifice a lot so that
- 13 they can have those things. We sacrifice a lot as adults
- 14 so our children can have good lives."

15 Will cut into food budget

- 16 Blackwood was paying attention when the province
- 17 announced its budget Thursday. She estimates that with
- 18 increases in income tax, fuel taxes, insurance, and the
- 19 HST, her family will give an additional \$5,000 to \$7,000 to the province this year.

Acknowledge addiction as mental illness, boost treatment options to battle opiate epidemic, experts say

- 1 To combat the ongoing opiate epidemic, the nation must acknowledge* addiction as a mental
- 2 illness and increase the availability of treatment options, local addiction experts said Monday.
- 3 The roundtable discussion, held at the Akron-Summit County Public Library, tackled the
- 4 complexities of battling the disease, which now has an annual death toll that's surpassed car
- 5 crashes and gun violence across the country.
- 6 U.S. Senator Rob Portman, R-Cincinnati, gathered the experts to the event, which attracted a
- 7 couple dozen people. He said recent estimates show 200,000 Ohioans are currently addicted to
- 8 opiates, which include prescription painkillers and heroin.
- 9 "That's roughly the size of Akron," he said, prompting gasps in the room.
- 10 Tammy Jensen, Oriana House's program administrator, said wait lists for treatment centers in
- 11 Summit County can reach up to 14 weeks for men and four weeks for women. Right now, there
- 12 are more than 140 people waiting for beds.
- 13 Portman said those wait times are a serious concern.
- 14 "A lot can happen in 14 weeks," he said.
- 15 Jerry Craig, executive director of the Summit County Alcohol, Drug Addiction & Mental Health
- 16 Services Board, moderated the panel. He said the ADM Board and other addiction resources
- 17 have worked to fight the epidemic but their resources are limited.
- 18 "Sometimes it feels like we're fighting a wildfire with a garden hose*," Craig said.

Help for Parents of Troubled Teens

- 1 As teenagers begin to assert their independence and find their own identity, many experience
- 2 behavioral changes that can seem bizarre and unpredictable to parents. Your sweet, obedient*
- 3 child who once couldn't bear to be separated from you now won't be seen within 20 yards of
- 4 you, and greets everything you say with a roll of the eyes or the slam of a door. These,
- 5 unfortunately, are the actions of a normal teenager.
- 6 As the parent of a troubled teen, you're faced with even greater challenges. A troubled teen
- 7 faces behavioral, emotional, or learning problems beyond the normal teenage issues. They
- 8 may repeatedly practice at-risk behaviors such as violence, skipping school, drinking, drug
- 9 use, sex, self-harming, shoplifting, or other criminal acts. Or they may exhibit symptoms of
- 10 mental health problems like depression, anxiety, or eating disorders.
- 11 It is important for parents to understand which behaviors are normal during adolescent
- 12 development, and which can point to more serious problems.

13	Typical Teen Behavior	Warning Signs of a Troubled Teen
14	Changing appearance. Keeping up with	Changing appearance can be a red flag if it's
15	fashion is important to teens. That may mean	accompanied by problems at school, or if
16	wearing provocative or attention-seeking	there's evidence of self-harm or extreme
17	clothing. Unless your teen wants tattoos,	weight loss or weight gain.
18	avoid criticizing and save your protests for	
19	the bigger issues. Fashions change, and so	
20	will your teen.

10 Hidden Housing Costs New Homeowners Don't Expect

- 1 You're a new homeowner congrats! The hardest part is over, for sure. Saying so long to most
- 2 of your savings isn't easy, after all. But the money hemorrhage isn't finished just yet. There are
- 3 several under-the-radar and often overlooked fees and expenses that accompany
- 4 homeownership that a newbie like you might miss. Keep tabs on these expenses with this list
- 5 of hidden housing costs.

6 1. Moving Expenses

- 7 Your belongings* have to get from A to B somehow, but have you considered the method? If you
- 8 plan to enlist the help of your friends, you'll save a huge chunk of change, but if you have more
- 9 than a few truckloads, it's probably best to hire movers and movers aren't cheap. Depending
- 10 on how much stuff you have, how many flights of stairs the movers are going up and down (my
- 11 fourth-floor movers haaaated me), and the distance they need to travel to deliver it, the cost
- 12 could reach upwards of \$10,000. With so many other expenses coming down the pipeline, this

The cookbook helping people with eating disorders recover Kashmira Gander — April 19, 2016

- 1 'Eating & Living: Recipes for Recovery' is a cookbook that aims to help those who have 2 suffered with eating disorders change their attitude towards food.
- 3 Food is complicated. It doesn't only sustain our bodies, but is central to our social lives. We use
- 4 it to celebrate, seek* comfort, and signify out identities. Because of this, a person recovering
- 5 from an eating disorder must not only transform their attitude towards food but also
- 6 themselves.
- 7 It is this stark* reality that prompted Francesca Baker, a marketer and writer who has
- 8 struggled with an eating disorder, to create a cookbook designed for and by people with
- 9 conditions such as anorexia, bulimia and binge-eating disorder. Such illnesses are often rooted
- 10 in a person's emotions.
- 11 The idea for Eating & Living: Recipes for Recovery came to the 29-year-old at a hospital where
- 12 she and fellow patients were receiving treatment for eating disorders. "Talking about the kinds
- 13 of things we used to love to eat, felt were missing out on, or wanted to cook in one of the more
- 14 practical focused sessions on the ward caused me to remark one day that we should create a
- 15 recipe book with all the recipes we knew. The seed was planted," recalls Baker.
- 16 The proceeds for the cookbook go to B-Eat, the UK's leading eating disorder charity, whose
- 17 latest figures show that 750,000 men and women in the UK have some form of the mental
- 18 illness.
